Research agenda focuses on the geographical landscapes as representations of power resulting in two books. *Territories of Profit* (Stanford University Press, 2004), compares corporate power, innovation, and geographies of profit-making in different historical periods focusing on the G.F. Swift Company and the rail and telegraph revolution, and Dell Computer and the Internet revolution. *Enclosure: Palestinian Landscapes in a Historical Mirror* (University of California Press, 2017) is a comparative historical geography of land conflict and dispossession across three case studies: the enclosures of early modern England, the Anglo-American colonial frontier, and contemporary Israel / Palestine. Teaching responsibilities includes courses on: Communication, Institutions, and Power; Dissent, Protest, and the History of Social Movements; Historical Methods; Representations of the Israeli / Palestinian Conflict; and Geographies of Difference, Exclusion and Conflict.
